



Dear Friends,

On the very last day of this month we celebrate Easter. The Easter weekend also sees us move to British Summer Time and we put our clocks forward an hour (if we never put them back in October then they go back to telling us the right time again!) So, the evening of Easter Sunday will see us, hopefully, enjoying a bit more daylight before the darkness of night settles in.

But the flip side for those first few weeks of British Summer Time is that the mornings will be darker to a later time, at least for a while. That's interesting as I reflect on the accounts of the resurrection that we have in the gospels. If I were to pick a favourite then John's account of Mary meeting the risen Jesus in the garden on that first Easter morning particularly resonates with me. John begins by telling us 'Early on that first day of the week, while it was still dark......'. Resurrection has already happened! In the darkness of the overnight Jesus has risen from the dead and Mary has vet to discover this to be true. We shall wake from our beds (maybe whilst it is still dark) on Easter day to this same truth.

John's gospel (and a bit of his first letter which is also in the New Testament) offers us some meditation on the theme of 'darkness and light'. John starts his gospel by telling us that light has come into the world in Jesus' incarnation and that the darkness will not overcome it. He records Jesus saying 'I am the light of the world' and now, nearing the end of his gospel. John makes it clear that in the darkness of the night, the light of the resurrection has come and as the sun rises on that first day of the week, the glorious and undimmed truth of the resurrection sets the world on fire for those who encountered him in the days of that first Easter.

The light that appeared on that first Easter

morning spans two thousand years and greets us too, and resurrection light and hope is so needed in our world today. It is hard to watch; read about; and hear the news that so often speaks of the darkness in places of war and turmoil; drought and famine; natural disaster and other tragedies. We may feel too that there is much darkness in our own lives as we experience pain and difficulty, sadness and sorrow. And yet, as John tells his story of that first glorious Easter morning, it is amidst Mary's tears and sorrow that the risen Lord calls her name and she hears and sees and experiences resurrection for herself.

My prayer for the Easter season is that resurrection light would come and bring hope and healing to our world and to our own lives. That we might walk in that same light bringing hope as we move forward in faith and proclaim with confidence and joy that Christ has risen, He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

The Little Book of Big Scams 5th edition is produced by the Metropolitan Police to make you aware of the latest and most prolific scams.

Ten golden rules to prevent fraud

Remember these ten golden rules to help you prevent fraud and beat the scammers.

- 1. Be suspicious of all 'too good to be true' offers and deals. There are no guaranteed get-rich-quick schemes.
- 2. Don't agree to offers or deals immediately. Insist on time to get independent or legal advice before making a decision.
- 3. Don't hand over money or sign anything until you've checked someone's credentials and their company's.
- 4. Never send money to anyone you don't know or trust, whether in the UK or abroad, or use methods of payment you're not comfortable with.
- 5. Never give banking or personal details to anyone you don't know or trust. This information is valuable so make sure you protect it.
- 6. Always log on to a website directly rather than clicking on links in an email.
- 7. Don't just rely on glowing testimonials. Find solid, independent evidence of a company's success.
- 8. Always get independent or legal advice if an offer involves money, time or commitment.
- 9. If you spot a scam or have been scammed, report it and get help.
- 10. Don't be embarrassed about reporting a scam. Because the scammers are cunning and clever there's no shame in being deceived. By reporting it, you'll make it more difficult for them to deceive others.


Christian Musical April 2024

ST ANDREW'S / TRINITY CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON MONDAY 5TH FEBRUARY 2024

1. **Welcom**e: Revd.Claire welcomed 26 members to the meeting.

2. **Opening Devotions**: Prayers were said by Revd Claire.

3. **Apologies**: KC, VE and EB

4. Minutes of the Meeting held on 27 November 2023 were accepted as a true record.

5. Matters Arising:

<u>Communication</u>: There is now **one generic e-mail list** for communications. PH said that if any member continues to receive some duplicated e-mails, then contact the sender and ask them to remove you from their list.

DW pointed out that St Andrew's has two **notice boards** and asked if they can be used to display all Notices and other items for those members who do not have access to the internet? BL confirmed that the notice boards could be used, and DB said she would arrange to have the Notices typed up and posted on the boards each week.

Revd Claire reminded the meeting that we are still looking for a volunteer to fulfil the role of **Communications person**.

6. Property and Lettings:

BL reported that Lettings have increased.

<u>Plaque</u>: JL volunteered to liaise with NC to agree some appropriate wording for the plaque to commemorate the long and important association between both the Boys and Girls Brigades with Trinity Church.

Nativity Items: Storage has been arranged.

7. Finance:

SW had produced a financial summary for St Andrews / Trinity to the end of January 2024 but she was waiting for information on budgets.

<u>Gift Aid</u>: Ex Trinity members, who are tax payers, and who previously gift aided their freewill giving, will be required to complete a new gift aid form for St Andrews. It was agreed that HB will arrange for the forms to be available for completion after Sunday worship. <u>Standing Orders</u>: Any member wishing to set up a standing order for freewill giving can obtain the St Andrews bank details from SW.

<u>Sunday Worship Offering</u>: It was confirmed after discussion, that gift aid can be claimed on the Sunday offering providing that there is no greater single denomination than a £20 note. Larger sums may be given but they must be made up with smaller notes.

<u>Circuit Assessments</u>: MH reported that next week there will be a discussion taking place on new assessments which will be based on figures from a year ago. Circuit will look at the funds we have, and set the assessment based on the money you have, membership and freewill giving.

MH confirmed that she will still be responsible for Trinity accounts until the building is finally closed.

<u>HSBC Bank</u>: MH reported that HSBC will now accept dual on-line banking, and Church Council agreed that MH will arrange a Finance Group meeting for the six St Andrews people who are already involved in finance to arrange some training as the church will

no longer issue cheques. Michael Parker was proposed as a seventh person. The Finance Group is SW, MH, LF, DB, LH, BL, MP.

<u>Bowling Club Donation</u>: Revd Claire asked for suggestions as to which charity we would choose to donate the £200. Several suggestions were put forward. After discussion, it was agreed £100 to the Camrose Centre and £100 to the Foodlink.

Church Fees: It was agreed that the following fees would apply from 2024:-

Weddings £150 Funerals £100 Organist £50

Stewards £25 per steward Technical £25 if required

Flowers Bespoke

The above fees would be waived if the service was for a Church member (or close relative of a Church member), or someone who was a regular worshipper at the Church.

Donations Received: £100 from the U5 Playtime Group

Donations from the funeral of Jack Evans.

8. Reports from other Groups:

<u>BB and U5</u> TS reported that U5 had welcomed several new families. 7 BB boys had attended summer camp. Still looking for more boys for Anchor Group. Overall BB remains very positive and remain the largest company in the Battalion.

Worship Group

Revd Claire reported on the Worship Group and she emphasised that all are welcome to attend the Worship Group meetings.

Lent

PA drew attention to the Lent Group scheduled to meet for 5 weeks starting on Wednesday 21st February. She has all the materials required and those interested should contact PA. Details will be in the Notices. LF offered to produce a slide and BL said that if required, the screens in the main hall can be moved across to make a smaller space.

Prayer Groups:

Revd Claire talked about the different aspects of Prayer Ministry that are part of the life of the church, some already happening and others, yet to get started.

From time to time it would be advantageous for all those involved in the different prayer groups to come together as one group to share and encourage each other eg: The Fountain Prayer Group, The Prayer Link, Healing Prayer etc.

Healing Prayers:

PA will talk about this new initiative after Sunday Worship. This new group has seven members, KC, DB, JB, PW, PA, JS, BM.

Audio/Visual Tech Group:

Prior to the meeting DW circulated the following proposal to Church Council members "That a working party be asked to investigate ways of improving the audio visual

experience in the Main Hall, report back on possible solutions, and to manage the chosen solution." DW gave a concise explanation of the scale, costs, and implications for the users of the Main Hall. He had gathered together a Project Team of nine people – MF, LF, BL, MP, TP, DW, PH, plus two external specialists. After considerable discussions, the proposal was agreed by the majority present.

<u>Pastoral Group Meeting</u>: A meeting will be held on 26 February 2024 at 2.00pm and existing members are invited to attend. LF will put a slide up on Sunday Worship. <u>Mission and Outreach</u>: Revd Claire wanted to get this group off the ground and a meeting date has been arranged for 19 March 2024, and the initial group will be JAM, U5, Foodlink, OTB and the Mug & Biscuit. Main Hall 2.00pm.

<u>Children and Families Meeting</u>: A meeting has been arranged for 2 April 2024 at 2.00pm in the Mug & Biscuit. Youth Groups, Boys Brigade.

9. Safeguarding/ GDPR:

MH confirmed that all DBS checks have been completed and she thanked all those who have attended the Safeguarding training groups. There will be an 'all day' Advanced Training course on the 11 May 2024 at Oakridge.

Revd Claire will liaise with PA to collect the existing **GDPR** information.

10. Name of our New Church Community / Logo

Revd Claire asked the members how we go about this process. MF suggested that we draw up a list of names that can be put to a vote. There was much discussion on possible names, and many sincere, impassioned speeches for, and against. It was emphasised that although the building will always be St Andrews, we must not lose sight of the fact that we are a new Church community that meets at South Ham. YH pointed out that we already have a logo which is the round window in the Main Hall. The name of 'South Ham Methodist Church at St Andrews Centre' was put forward as a new name, and after further discussions Revd Claire considered that sufficient members of the Church Council were minded to adopt the new name. It was agreed that the proposal should go out to Church members after Easter, via a ballot paper, which will be something like:

"A number of people in St Andrews / Trinity Church Council have minded to propose the following name change for our new Church community, to be called South Ham Methodist Church at St Andrews Centre

Would you please let us have your view on the proposed name.

Do you agree with the suggested name?

I prefer a different name and suggest

I would like it to remain as St Andrews Church

The name is not important to me, I remain neutral.

11. Any Other Business:

<u>Sunday Worship</u>: DB mentioned that when the candle is shown on the screen people continue chatting and the Church is very noisy. It was agreed that at 10.25 am the congregation will be invited to be still and prepare themselves for worship.

Church Council Meeting continued.....

The Proposed Amalgamation of the Kennet and Test Valley Circuit with the Basingstoke and Reading Circuit

The details of this proposed merger was sent to all Church Council members who were asked to give any feedback. Church Council were not required to vote on this proposal, but the Circuit will.

The Singing Group: It was confirmed that this had now been reinstated.

<u>Farewells</u>: Revd Claire mentioned that Jennifer and Tony Pitt would soon be leaving Hampshire. Revd Claire thanked Tony and Jennifer for giving so generously of their time and energy to our Church and Circuit over many years, and wished them all the best in their future home.

12. Date of Next Meeting

13 May 2024 at 2.00pm in the Main Hall. The meeting closed with The Grace.

Why I Joined the R.A.F.

I have been asked many times "Why did you volunteer for the R.A.F. in 1941?"



I was no hero, I was a 19 year old boy who knew that eventually he would be called up and put into one of the services. I wanted to go in the R.A.F. and I found out that anyone who had been in the Air Cadets who volunteered usually got in the R.A.F. I had therefore decided to wait until I was nearly called up and I would then volunteer.

Then the following happened.

I had been home for my dinner and was cycling back to work when I heard a plane. I could not see it so I pulled to the side of the road by a house and it appeared – it was a German Dornia Bomber and it passed me and followed the road quite low and I heard a machine gun. It was not policy in those days to print in the papers but being local I found out what had happened. This bomber had tried for the docks and dropped three bombs and then came past me following the road and just passed me, it machined gunned a civilian bus. The bombing of the docks was the war but the gunning was something very different.....

I then decided that brutality was in the German make-up. This was confirmed later on with the shooting of prisoners, the wasting of entire villages and of course the holocaust.

This is why I volunteered earlier than I expected.

What Journey are you on?



A Few of My Favourite Things

These are a few of my 'Favourite Things' inspiring me on my ongoing Christian Journey in Faith.

Old Testament verse

I get strength from Isaiah 40:28-31, particularly verse 31, "but those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles." Just imagine!

New Testament verse

Someone from history who inspires me

Oskar Schindler. Known to all of us through the film Schindler's List. He was a German industrialist during the Second World War who saved the lives of 1,200 Jews who worked in his factories by bribing Nazi officials and relocating his employees away from the extermination camps. What better example to all of us to "Love your neighbour as yourself"!

A place where I feel close to God

Our God is always with us wherever we are, but it helps us to have a quiet and peaceful place close to us to be with Him and talk with Him. Mine is the Vyne National Trust Woods near Basingstoke. A place to walk, sit, meditate, and be part of the nature of His creation.

An impressive faith building

The Al Fatah Grand Mosque Bahrain is certainly a most impressive faith building, Built in the 1980s it is one of the largest mosques in the world, Throughout the mosque is Kufic calligraphy. It is an attraction to tourists as well as local worshippers. As a tourist some 10 years ago I took a guided tour around the mosque ending with a discussion with the lady Muslim tour guide on the ministry of Jesus, a prophet in the Muslim faith. We could not agree of course, and I advised her to talk with the Holy Spirit for guidance. This resulted in me being aggressively ordered to leave the mosque immediately, which I did, or be arrested.

I have no regrets in what I said, as Jesus himself was thrown out of the synagogue in Nazareth during his ministry (Luke 4:28-30), and we all are guided by Him in our ministries.

A memorable journey

A week's holiday in Jordan with my daughter Jasmine some 10 years ago was a memorable journey as we travelled from north to south visiting some of the many historical sites there. Care Home Ministry in Basingstoke

There are several members in our Basingstoke churches who are involved in Care Home Ministry in one way or another. At the very end of January a small group of us met together to share what we are already doing, to discuss whether we might be able to work more collaboratively and to consider whether we would like to grow this ministry and, if so, how we might do this.

So what's already happening?

Barchester St Thomas Care Home



Nigel Merry and Andrew Stead, lay reader at St Michael's, provide a monthly service (no sermon) on 1st Sunday of the month.



Nigel leads a weekly Men's Club with activities on a Friday afternoon. These visits include pastoral / befriending conversations. There are also 'special' events at Christmas, Easter etc. A Catholic minister also visits.

Barchester Ashcombe House

Marianne Sales and an ecumenical team visit every Thursday morning during term-time for Bible Storytelling followed by some pastoral / befriending conversations with both Staff and residents. During the school holidays we continue to go in at the same time but we do something different (at present this is a Bible verse, followed by a short reflection, a prayer and a hymn). After a recent session one of the residents said 'it was wonderful, it made the day'. It is amazing that such a small amount of our time can make such a big difference to the residents.



Since September we have started to offer a Communion service at Christmas and Easter. We did a Nativity Carol service this last year as well. Marianne goes in separately and plays the piano – usually short extracts from classical works, but carols at Christmas and Old Time Music Hall songs from time to time.



Oakridge House

In times past there used to be a group from Oakridge church who visited this Care Home. Christine Embleton has re-established the link by providing a Carol service in 2022 and 2023. An Easter service is being planned.

Claire has been to visit individual residents separately.

Lady Susan Court

A monthly Communion Service is held here. Claire shares in the leadership of this, alternating with an Anglican colleague from St Michael's.

Oak Lodge, Oakley

At present Edna Rawlins visits two Trinity members who are residents in this Care Home.

We were all surprised at just how much valuable work we are already involved with in our Care Homes.

How might we develop the work?

At Ashcombe House Marianne is considering the possibility of formalising Sunday afternoons to include some befriending whilst she is playing the piano.

Claire is considering the possibility of introducing some Bible Study at Lady Susan Court where we have resident.

A resident at Basingfield Court is a member at Old Basing. The possibility of linking with members from Old Basing and providing a sing-song on a monthly basis was discussed. Marianne would be willing to work with the members of Old Basing and play for this if they are interested.



Anna Chaplaincy

Claire talked about Anna chaplaincy and is investigating the possibility of some training for anyone interested.

So how might you help?

We already have a small team of people who help us on an occasional basis. It would be really useful to 'grow' this team a bit so that if we need some extra singers for a Carol Service or another event we have a group of people we can call on – very often there is no requirement other than to go in at an agreed time and to talk to people.

You will probably need a current DBS certificate, but that can be arranged if necessary. Please talk to one of us if you would be willing to join our team of 'occasional helpers', even if only once a month, once every two months or even once a year at the annual Carol Service.

Looking for the Resurrection

An old couple are driving down the motorway when the wife gets a call from their daughter. 'Mum, there's a car driving the wrong way down the motorway!' The wife warns her husband that there is a lunatic on the motorway. Her husband, clutching the wheel in terror, replies: 'One lunatic? There are dozens of them, all headed straight for us!'

What we see is determined by our perspective on life.

In the Nicene Creed we say: 'We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come.' In the gospel accounts of the Resurrection, there is a lot of looking and seeing. Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James and Salome went early to the tomb. They saw the stone rolled aside and inside the tomb a young man dressed in white said to them: 'Don't be alarmed. You are looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who was crucified. He has risen! He is not here. See the place where they laid Him...He is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see Him' (Mark 16: 6,7).

Like the women we would probably have been left 'trembling and bewildered' by what we saw that morning. Had the body been taken? Was the young man an angel or deceiver? Was Jesus raised to life again, or was this an elaborate hoax?

Easter gives us a choice. We can approach life looking for disappointment, fear and despair. Or we can look for resurrection and find not just an empty tomb, but encounter the living Christ. He continues to meet us in our daily lives bringing new hope, forgiveness of sin, healing and wholeness and the assurance of His presence through the darkest of times. God invites us to see our lives differently and look for Christ's resurrection life at work in our lives and the people around us.

The study, Youth Culture and Trends also found that the shift to spending more time online with others, rather than in face-to-face relationships, mirrors a reported decline in the satisfaction with friendships and rise in loneliness. (PP)

Our young people are just so unhappy

Young people in the UK are feeling more lonely, and yet are less likely to have a stable relationship or friendship than they did, even a decade ago.

So finds the Boys Brigade, which carried out an extensive study as part of its recent 140th anniversary events.

Almost half of the young people questioned admitted that they were in regular mental distress, and yet had had no medical diagnosis or treatment.

Rates of selfharm, disability, and obesity have also gone up. One in every seven young people is even unhappy with their appearance.

willow bark for fever, pain and childbirth. And even the peoples of ancient China, Rome, and Native America all discovered and used plants containing salicylic acid.

From 1763, willow bark was used a lot up until 1859. Finally, in early 1899 the new compound was named and registered Aspirin. The 'A' comes from acetyl and 'spir' from the first part of *Spirea ulmaria* (Meadowsweet) a botanical source of salicylic acid.

The story of aspirin

You will probably have taken aspirin, in one form or other, many times. But how much do you know of its history?

It was 125 years ago this month, on 6th March 1899 that the German pharmaceutical company Bayer first patented aspirin (acetylsalicylic acid).

But this is based on salicylic acid, which was used in herbal medicines as far back as Sumerian times, in 2500 BC. It was then that the Assyrians used willow leaves for rheumatic disease. The Egyptians also used willow leaves, as well as myrtle, to ease joint pain or inflammation.

In Greece, Hippocrates (460-377 BC) recommended an extract of
